

Do you have a child starting Kindergarten in September 2025?

Are you interested in learning more about the French Immersion program?

The French Immersion program accepts 5 and 6 year-olds at the beginning of their formal schooling. French Immersion is intended for non-French speaking students who wish to develop a high level of proficiency in both official languages. Students enrolled in French Immersion learn the same BC curriculum as students in the English-language program. The major distinction between the Englishlanguage program and French Immersion is that the language of instruction and communication in the immersion component is French. French Immersion is a program that can offer your child: a fun, effective and challenging way to learn French at an early age, the opportunity to learn the same curriculum as the regular English program, in French; an opportunity to participate in rich French cultural learning experiences; a bilingual future.

THE MIDDLE YEARS DEVELOPMENT INSTRUMENT (MDI) IS COMING TO YOUR SCHOOL IN JANUARY!

Central Okanagan Public Schools has partnered with the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP) at the University of British Columbia to measure and promote children's social and emotional development, health, well-being, and assets through the Middle Year Development Instrument (MDI). The Middle Years Development Instrument (MDI) is a self-report questionnaire that asks children in middle childhood about their thoughts, feelings, and experiences. The MDI is the first survey of its kind

to gather information about the lives of children both in school, in the home and in the community, from their own perspective. The survey questions align with the BC Ministry of Education's K-12 curriculum, which includes a focus on promoting children's personal and social competencies. Grade 5 students are invited to complete the MDI during class time between January 15th and March 15, 2024.

Squads, or "Family Groupings' as sometimes called in schools refers to the practice of grouping students from different age groups and grade levels together, often for certain activities or learning experiences. The benefits of family groupings in schools include:

Promotes Peer Mentoring and Leadership

- Older students serve as role models and mentors for younger ones, fostering a sense of responsibility and leadership.
- Younger students can learn from the experiences of older peers, which can boost their confidence and academic growth.
- This mentoring dynamic helps develop communication and social skills among all students.

Encourages a Supportive Community

- Students develop closer bonds with peers across different age groups, creating a sense of belonging, togetherness, and a supportive school environment.
- The mixed-age group allows for stronger relationships, as students interact more regularly with a wider variety of classmates.m This promotes acceptance and inclusion regradless of physical appearnace, skin colour, ethnicity, culture, and gender orientation.

Improves Social Skills and Emotional Development

• Family groupings promote empathy, cooperation, and conflict resolution as students work together and interact across different age groups.



Cold Weather Guidelines

With the cold weather arriving, we wanted to remind parents of the following:

Clothing – The Okanagan Valley has temperatures that frequently go below -15 degrees Celsius. Students need to be dressed for cold weather. Because staying inside is not an option, it is critical that students arrive at school each day prepared for cold weather. Students dressed for cold



weather have a warm coat with a hood or a toque, gloves or mittens and warm boots. For those students who like to play a lot in the snow, snow pants are recommended as they will help keep students dry. Students and parents should check the local forecast for up-to-date weather information. Students must be dressed appropriately so that they remain safe and

comfortable during the following times:

- Outside playtime before and after school
- Lunchtime playtime
- Recess
- Fire Drills (conducted at all temperatures)
- Bus breakdowns
- Unscheduled and scheduled outside breaks and learning experiences

Snowballs/Snow – a reminder to all students that throwing snow or snowballs is not allowed. So that everyone can have fun and stay safe while playing outside, please reinforce with your children the importance of not throwing or kicking snow. Students will be encouraged to build something with snow but not to throw or kick it.

Icy Conditions - one of the biggest challenges in winter is navigating in icy conditions. Please take extra care outside especially around steps and corners. Also, students should be respectful of other students who are building snow sculptures. Please do not do anything to damage something that another student has taken the time to build.





School Based Team

As a parent, you may be invited to a School Based Team (SBT) meeting. The SBT is a group of school-based personnel who work collaboratively with parents to best support their children in developing their academic and social/emotional skill set and by suggesting, providing, and implementing variety supports and strategies.

Who is on the team?

The SBT includes the following members:

- Principal and/or Vice Principal
- Learning Assistance Teacher (SBT chair)
- Classroom Teacher
- Parent/Guardian

Often the SBT can also include:

- School Counselor
- Speech Language Pathologist

On a case-by-case basis the SBT can include:

- Inclusion Teacher
- Indigenous Advocate
- Outside community support (pediatrician/therapist etc.)
- District Student Support Services staff



HOW TO APPLY

PLEASE NOTE: The application process is online only. You are required to have a valid email account.

No internet access? Please contact your school for assistance.

Online applications begin on Monday, February 3, 2025 at 7:00 am. Applications will be assigned a date-time stamp on a first-come, first-served basis, which will factor into a student's placement priority.

Complete the online application as early as possible, and provide the required documents listed below directly to the school in person or by email by Friday, March 14, 2025.

- 1. Student's Birth Certificate or other government issued proof of age and citizenship.
- 2. Proof of Parent/Guardian B.C. Residency
 - a. Combination BC Driver's License and Services Card (copy of both sides); or,
 - b. BC Services Card (copy of both sides) and one item from the list of supporting documentation below; or,
 - c. Proof of application for BC Medical Services Plan and one item from the list of supporting documentation below.
- 3. Proof of Parent/Guardian Living Address/Supporting Documentation
 - · Ownership of a dwelling or long-term lease or rental of a dwelling;
 - Documentation indicating British Columbia residence (i.e. utility bill);
 - British Columbia registration of an automobile;
 - · British Columbia Driver's License (copy of both sides); or,
 - A current income tax return filed as a British Columbia resident.

AFTER Thursday, August 28, 2025

New in-catchment area enrollments: Parents will be notified by a confirmation email when the school has accepted the student's application for enrollment. Board Policy 405R – Student Placement (Regulations), will be used to determine student placement and priority.

New out-of-catchment area enrollments: Parents <u>may not</u> be notified until after the summer enrollment period is over and all in-catchment area students have been placed.

Qualifying age: The School Act requires that a child must be five years of age by December 31, 2025, to qualify for school enrollment in September 2025. No exceptions.
