Student School Supplies and Cultural Fees

Parents need not worry about purchasing school supplies for their child. The school bulk purchases supplies and passes on the savings to parents! Teachers will hand out supplies as needed which helps keeps things organized and allows students access to supplies when they run out. Also, art supplies such as construction paper, drawing paper, bristle board, glitter, pipe cleaners, popsicle sticks, and many other incidentals are covered by these costs. **School supplies fees are \$40.00.** The prompt payment of "School Supply Fees" by our parents does much to keep our record keeping efficient. Unless other arrangements have been made, we expect that all fees will be paid by October 1st.

If you are unable to pay your child's school fees, please contact administration. Thank you for your efforts in this regard.

Cultural Fees - Schools also charge a \$10.00 Cultural Fee. This fee provides various cultural performances and concerts in our gym throughout the school year. The performances include live theatre, musicians and other talented groups that have been carefully selected by a District Committee consisting of both School District personnel and parents.

Meet the Teacher Conferences

Wednesday, October 8th and Thursday, October 9th, 2025



Our first Parent-Teacher Conferences will take place on October 8th and 9th, 2025. There will be an early dismissal at 12:30 on both days to accommodate afternoon and evening appointments. These conferences are a great opportunity to share information between home and school, update parents on their child's progress, and set learning goals. Some teachers encourage students to attend with their parents so please check with your child's teacher. Information will be communicated by teachers closer to the date of the conferences.

Staffing and School Organization Updates

We had approximately 12 new registrations (11 English and 1 FI) over the summer. Our projected enrollment is 380 students, down from last year by 10 students. We are currently have space in all grades in English but we are full in most classes in French. This year's class lists will be posted on our website (by student PEN #) after 3:00 pm on Friday, August 29, 2025. They are located in the 'News' section on the 'Welcome Back' page. Class lists will also be displayed in the school's front windows (by student name) on the first day of school. Please Note: If you are looking for your child's PEN number, it was included on the June report card. Due to the Freedom of Information Act, we are not permitted to post names for more than an hour on the first day of school. Please note that the class lists are TENTATIVE until September 5, 2025, for several reasons:

- Some students may not return.
- We have a list of students that have registered over the summer to add to our class lists.
- There is a good chance that Davidson Road and Oyama may be sending us some students. Davidson had close to 15 registrations over the summer, and they may be redirected to us if they do not have space.

Changes may occur due to enrolment growth or decline. If your child is reassigned to a different classroom during the first week of September, you will be contacted.



Class lists will be posted on our website (by student PEN #) after 3:00 pm on Friday, August 29, 2025. They are located in the 'News' section on the 'Welcome Back' page. Due to the Freedom of Information Act, we are not permitted to post names for more than an hour on the first day of school.


We started the process of placing students in classes in May, but we do not complete the process until after the registration period in the last week of August. Your child's teacher in May and June played a significant role in making these decisions. Other teachers, as well as Administration also participate and, in some cases, staff from support services (i.e., Learning Assistance Teacher, Counselor, Resource Teacher) are also consulted. The development of class lists is given a great deal of time, careful thought and understanding with the knowledge teachers have of each student and what will be in the child's best interest. Because teachers see how students function in a classroom every day, they are confident that they can make a suitable placement for your child. There are many factors that are considered in the process:

- Academic achievement
- Class size, composition and balance between boys and girls
- Student special needs
- Learning and teaching styles
- Social groupings
- Teacher and School Based Team recommendations
- Instructional groupings
- Previous placement history

It should be noted that there are several factors, including changing enrolments, Provincial class size and composition legislation, and budget restrictions, that make the placement of students a very complex task. Therefore, parent requests will be accepted as input but should not be considered as the driving force behind placement decisions. Our goal in creating each classroom composition is to provide the best possible educational placement for the students within the various constraints of the system within which we function. We appreciate your understanding of this very important issue.

We will reassess the class and school organization after the August registration period as we become aware of any enrolment changes that have taken place over the summer. As is the case every year in all schools, teaching assignments and class organizations are subject to change **during the first week of school.** Requests for placements are considered during the class building process, but not all can be accommodated for a variety of factors, and we are not able to accommodate parent requests for students to be 'switched' from one class to another once classes have been set. In this process, the Principal has the ultimate responsibility under the *School Act* for the final decision regarding placements of students.

Class lists are tentative until Friday, September 5, 2025. Changes may occur due to enrolment growth or decline. If your child is reassigned to a different classroom during the first week of September, you will be contacted. If your child is assigned to a different classroom during the first week, please help us by reassuring your child that all will be well and we will do our best to help this transition.

Important Traffic Safety Information

A recent Health & Safety assessment conducted by the school, in consultation with the District's Traffic Safety Officer, the RCMP, the District of Lake Country Bylaw Officer, and the Parent Advisory Committee determined that the use of the 'Kiss and Go Lane" between the hours of 2:00 to 3:00 pm poses a risk to adult and student pedestrian safety. Therefore, please be advised that the 'Kiss and Go Lane" is closed from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. during the school week to all traffic except emergency vehicles. The Kiss and Go Lane remains open for the morning drop-off. Please use the marked lane on the left side. It is single lane traffic only and parents do not need to wait to get to the front of the line anymore. Students can be dropped off anywhere in the lane as the right-hand side is now used for foot traffic. This should make the drop-off process quite a bit faster.

If parents do not choose to use the Kiss and Go Lane, there is also ample parking on the surrounding streets (a luxury compared to some schools). Our recommendation is that parents plan with their children to meet in a designated location on the street. The safest option for parents of younger children or for parents who have concerns is to park on the street and either accompany your child to the school in the morning and/or pick up your child at the school and walk with them back to your vehicle after school.

We realize that some parents will be inconvenienced by this course of action, but it is important for us all to put the safety of our students first!



School Based Team

As a parent, you may be invited to a School Based Team (SBT) meeting. The SBT is a group of school-based personnel who work collaboratively with parents to best support their children in developing their academic and social/emotional skill set and by suggesting, providing, and implementing variety supports and strategies.

Who is on the team?

The SBT includes the following members:


- Principal and/or Vice Principal
- Learning Assistance Teacher (SBT chair)
- Classroom Teacher

Often the SBT can also include:

- School Counselor
- Speech Language Pathologist

On a case by case basis the SBT can include:

- Resource Teacher
- Aboriginal Advocate
- Outside community support (pediatrician/therapist etc.)
- District Student Support Services staff



Strong Start Early Learning Centre



Participate with your young child (aged birth to five) in play-based early learning activities – including stories, music, and art. At no cost to families, this early learning drop-in program helps children develop the skills for a successful transition to Kindergarten. Open during school hours. StrongStart programs provide school-based early learning services for families or caregivers and their pre-school aged children. The programs are intended to fill a niche for young children who are not attending childcare and are in the home with their parent or other caregivers, such as grandparents or nannies. Both children and adults benefit from StrongStart BC early learning programs – children have access to high-quality

learning environments and benefit from social interactions while the adults who accompany them learn new ways to support learning, both at the program and at home. 


Home and School Communication

We are always interested in enhancing our home/school communication. Here are a few ways that we plan to keep you informed about what's happening at the school...

School Calendar - All dates, field trips, special events, and anything of importance to our community will be

on our 'Events' section on our website. There will not be a paper copy of the monthly calendar published. There are two reasons for this. One, having a single source for storing the information minimizes the chance that an incorrect date is published. For example, once a paper copy goes out and there is a subsequent date change, you can't pull back all the paper copies that were printed off. Second, the online calendar is accessible from any device at any time. -Parents and students can view our web calendar on the main page (just click on the little blue arrow) to get the most accurate, up



to date information without wasting paper and harming our environment. The web calendar also allows parents to view months in advance all the way to June. Of course, parents who do not have access to a computer can still request a paper copy in the office.

Weekly Email Updates – Every weekend, we will send a **Week-At-A-Glance** email to families. This will include weekly announcements, informational items, and calendar updates.

"School Messenger" – Occasionally, you will receive a brief message on your phone, text or email to let you know of important reminders or unexpected changes to the school calendar or important reminders.

School Website – We will be using our website as a means of enhancing home and school communication. We will do our best to update the page on a weekly basis. our website is updated regularly and is another source of information for you. Check it out at www.pge.sd23.bc.ca.

School Newsletter—This is probably the most common way to keep up on what's happening at PGE. However, we also want to cut back on the use of paper to help mother nature! Therefore, all our newsletters are published on our website. Parents may also request a copy from the office in person. All monthly newsletters are posted on the website on or near the first of each month. An email will be sent out notifying parents when each newsletter is ready for viewing and a link to its location.

Plastic Spoons and Forks



To reduce the amount of plastic in our landfill and ultimately in our lakes and oceans, we do not provide plastic forks and spoons for students. We are encouraging families to send reusable cutlery when packing a lunch requiring a fork or spoon. We encourage caregivers to pack a 'litter free lunch.' A litter free lunch is one way

to reduce garbage. A waste-free lunch (sometimes called a litter-less, smart, garbage-less, waste-free, no-garbage or waste-not lunch) means that you have no packaging to throw away when you're done. All you're left with is apple cores, banana peels and other biodegradable extras. Also, all items sent in a lunch will be returned at the end of the day (used or unused).



Allergy Awareness Zone

We have a number of students at PGE who are at extreme risk due to nuts, nut products, peanut oil or flour as well as kiwis. These students do not have to ingest nuts; they can have a life-threatening reaction to airborne particles or residue left on surfaces. For the safety of all our students, PGE is declared an ALLERGY AWARE SCHOOL and we ask your cooperation by not sending these products to school. This includes but is not limited to peanut butter, granola bars with nuts, chocolate bars with nuts, trail mixes with nuts, etc. Please read labels. If one of these children is in your child's class, you will also be receiving a letter shortly outlining the procedures requested for keeping the student, class, and child safe.

All our staff have been made aware of this situation and been instructed in the correct procedures regarding anaphylactic shock. Prevention, of course, is the best approach and, therefore, we are requesting your cooperation by reinforcing with your children the importance of washing hands before and after eating and if possible, refrain from sending any products containing nuts to school with your child.

Have a Concern? Here's How to Get Help

From time to time, students or parents may disagree with the decisions or actions of teachers and/or administrators concerning the education, health, or safety of students. Some areas, which may raise concerns, relate to the assignment of students to classes or courses, grading practices, participation in or exclusion from school activities, or student discipline. Students or parents who disagree with or wish to question decisions or actions that are taken by teachers and/or administrators are expected to seek a resolution by pursuing the following steps:

<u>Step One</u> – the person with the concern must make every attempt to meet with the employee who made the decision to try to reach a solution.

<u>Step Two</u> - if the problem is unresolved, the person with the concern shall meet with the Vice Principal or Principal.

<u>Step Three</u> - if the person with the concern is not satisfied with the response provided by the Principal, he or she shall contact the Assistant Superintendent for Peter Greer Elementary at the School District Board Office. His name is Jamie Robinson and the number to call is 250.860.8888.

All concerns are taken very seriously, and every attempt will be made to resolve a concern in a timely manner once all the information has been gathered and options considered.

School Food Programs

PGE currently operates three four food programs:

Breakfast Program – this breakfast and snack nutrition program has traditionally been funded by President's Choice Children's Charity Fund and operated by Food for Thought. Last year, President's Choice Charity Fund provided a grant to the school for \$10,000! Thanks to their support, we can offer our students a healthy meal or snack during

the school day. Food for Thought provides free breakfast for up to 1600 school-aged children a day across 30 schools. Nutritious breakfast items are made available to all classrooms each weekday morning before classes begin. While this program is geared toward students facing food insecurity, any student is welcome to sit with their friends and share a meal in a safe and inclusive environment. Thank you to **CEA Connie Radis** for coordinating this program and Vice Principal



Kuzik for applying for and receiving grant money for this program from President's Choice.

Brown Bag Lunch Program – this program provides lunches to students experiencing food scarcity and is fully funded by the BC Ministry of Education's Feeding Futures Grant. Families can request this service by contacting the office.

Backpack Program – this program provides groceries to families in need and is fully funded by the BC Ministry of Education's Feeding Futures Grant. Families can request this service by contacting the office.

BC Fruit and Vegetable Program – a locally sourced, fresh fruit or vegetable is delivered to each class once a month. Students enjoyed eating blueberries, Mandarin oranges, baby carrots, apples, pears, snap peas, and mini cucumbers.

<u>It is essential</u> that information regarding "Emergency Contacts" and phone numbers be provided for our staff to use if we need to contact you quickly.

Attendance Procedures/Late to School

The School District uses an electronic/app system for reporting student absences. The new system is a **safer** way to keep account of our students. You can enter absences in three ways, although we highly recommend using the School Messenger App, available in the App Store or Google Play. You



may also enter an absence using the online parent portal or by simply calling the school and following the 'prompts.'

A student's timely attendance at school is central to success at school and is also a lifelong skill valued by society. We hope that you support us in setting this expectation. Often, the most crucial information is given at the start of the day; the tone is set and goals for the day are being discussed. All students who arrive late must *check-in at the office* before going to class. In order to maintain a safe environment, please sign-in at the office with your child or send a note to confirm your knowledge of the late arrival.

Student Accident Insurance

Central Okanagan Public Schools does not insure expenses for student injuries that occur on school grounds or during school activities. Parents and guardians can voluntarily purchase private accident insurance. The Kids Plus Accident Insurance Program that was previously offered to our students was discontinued in 2019. The IA Financial Group now offers the Family Accident Reimbursement Plan (FARP) which is a voluntary plan that provides coverage for students and their families against accidental injury, unexpected medical expenses, and critical illness.

Updated Restrictions for Cell Phones and Personal Digital Devices

In accordance with the new <u>requirements from the Ministry of Education and Child Care</u>, schools across our district have updated their Student Code of Conduct to include the restricted use of cell phones and personal digital devices during school hours effective July 1, 2024.

Our <u>School Code of Conduct</u> has been revised to reflect the new requirements regarding cell phone use in schools accordingly.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CODE OF CONDUCT SECTION

Responsible Student Use of Personal Digital Devices, School Technology, and District Network Services

Student use of personal digital devices (any device used to communicate and/or access the internet), school technology, and district networks at school is for educational purposes.

Students must abide by the school's Code of Conduct and procedures, as well as Central Okanagan Public Schools Policy 486: Student Use of Network Services and Digital Technologies.

Students will:

- Secure, power off and store personal digital devices during instructional (i.e. class time) and non-instructional time (i.e. breaks/lunch) at Elementary schools unless instructed by the Principal or school staff;
- Use personal digital devices during instructional time for instructional purposes and digital literacy skills as instructed by the Principal or school staff;
- Ensure personal digital devices are not used in areas where privacy is expected, such as restrooms and change rooms:
- Be permitted to use personal digital devices to support accessibility, accommodations, medical and health needs;
- Always take precautions to ensure online safety, privacy, and security;
- Treat others with respect and kindness when using digital devices and district network services:
- Always use digital devices and district network services responsibly and with academic integrity.

Schools will ensure that all students have equitable and developmentally appropriate access to technology to meet curricular requirements. Students are not required to have their own personal digital device or cellphone at school.

The use of personal digital devices, school technology, and district networks is a privilege. Staff may revoke a student's access to devices because of inappropriate student conduct.

Violations of the school code of conduct could result in appropriate restorative processes or disciplinary actions including suspension and police intervention.

As part of our commitment to help our students develop digital citizenship, our educators will continue teaching our students how to use their personal digital devices and technology in a responsible and respectful way.

We ask that you support our staff and discuss these new restrictions with your child before the upcoming school year. If parents/caregivers need to contact their child during the school day, they should call the school office.

On a related note, the school is not responsible for lost, missing, or damaged personal digital devices that students choose to bring to school.
