

### Message from your Admin Team

April was a busy month. On April 10, we welcomed members from the Central Okanagan Public School's *Indigenous Education Council*. Each board of education is required to establish and maintain an Indigenous education council (IEC) to support the provision of comprehensive and equitable education and support services for Indigenous (First Nations, Metis, and Inuit) students and improve Indigenous student outcomes. This includes advising on the appropriate integration of Indigenous worldviews and perspectives, advising on grants in relation to Indigenous students, and ensuring respect for our local First Nations whose territories our schools are on. The council members observed students learning from and alongside syilx multimedia visual artist **Sheldon Pierre Louis**. As part of our yearlong "Welcoming the Salmon" project, Sheldon spent a week at PGE helping us co-create a legacy artwork for the school foyer. This piece will deepen our collective responsibility to tmix<sup>w</sup> (all living things) and expand our understanding of siwl+k<sup>w</sup> (water). Students collaborated with Sheldon to craft a canvas salmon using fabric from tipi end pieces. Their individual creations will form part of a larger collective salmon installation, serving as a centerpiece to welcome the salmon home. This artwork will remain at the school as a shared expression of learning and connection.

This past week, our students in grades 1-5 participated in the 'Okanagan Freestyle Fencing' program in our gym. Fencing is an exciting sport that improves cardio, strength, balance, and eye-hand coordination, and it can be matched to all ability levels! Fencing is often called physical chess, as it involves the same aspects of focus, strategy, and decision making. These mental aspects of the sport help our athletes to become confident and disciplined.

Track and Field - Now that we can count on more sunshine and warmer afternoons (maybe!!), you will be seeing the Intermediates honing their Track and Field skills three days a week after lunch. Thanks to a group of willing teachers, we are once again providing an array of track and field experiences for grades 4 and 5. Each student will be exposed to many new skills that they can apply to our fun Apple Bowl Track and Field Meet, slated for Wednesday, May 26. If you are not aware, this is the day when we take all intermediates to participate, along with Oyama Traditional School, in a fun, light-hearted track and field experience at the Apple Bowl, where good sportsmanship, honest effort and teamwork are more important than talent. We are still looking for parent volunteers. If you can help, please contact your child's teacher. Students looking for a competitive experience may be chosen to attend the School District Track Meet on Thursday, June 5. We will be allowed to send two boys and two girls from each grade to each of the events. There is also an additional competitive opportunity for students offered by Okanagan Athletics Club. They are hosting a "Twilight Meet" on May 23<sup>rd</sup>. It's open to all ages from 9 years old and older. This meet is perfect for those wanting to compete or for those wishing to learn more about Track and Field. There will be coaches at each event to help athletes that want some pointers and guidance. ### **Kindergarten Transition Information for 2025-2026**

Families should have received confirmation of registration letters for both English and French at École Peter Greer Elementary for the 2025-2026 school year.

We are so excited to meet all of you and your children! To start the welcoming process, we ask that you:

- Attend the Parent Information Session on Zoom @ 4:30 pm Wednesday, May 21. This will be a short presentation of what to expect and an opportunity to ask questions. You can join the Zoom meeting: https://sd23.zoom.us/j/6512159894 (Meeting ID: 651 215 9894)
- Show your child our **introductory video**. A link will be emailed to you and placed on our website in early June. The video will help students familiarize themselves with some PGE faces and spaces.
- If there is anything you would like us to know about your child that you feel may ease their transition, please fill out this optional <u>digital form</u>. We will be gathering additional information during the first week of school in September.
- Play Based Sessions You and your child are invited to attend school for a learning session so that they are
  introduced to a school-based learning through play experience. Sessions are limited to 8 students for each
  group so please RSVP by signing up for a session <a href="here">here</a>. These sessions are being held in our StrongStart
  Centre.

The other half of the *Kindergarten Transition* process will take place in the first week back to school starting on Tuesday, September 3.

In late August, you will receive a letter/email detailing additional plans for helping your child make a successful transition to Kindergarten. Some key dates for these plans are:



Tuesday, Sept. 2	First Day of School for Grades 1-5. Orientation Mini Session for K Students and

Parents. The day will be divided into two sessions and a parent or guardian <u>must</u> <u>attend</u>. More detailed information will be shared in a separate letter to parents in

late August.

Wednesday, Sept. 3 Mini Sessions for Students Only Thursday, Sept. 5 Mini Sessions for Students Only

Friday, Sept. 5 No school for your child as this day will be used for forming/deciding classroom

placements for the year. Please expect a call on this day to learn who your child's

Kindergarten teacher will be.

Monday, Sept. 8 First Full day of Kindergarten for all students

The purpose of these mini-sessions is to share information about basic daily routines and expectations for kindergarten students and to provide an opportunity for your child to see the school/class and meet some of the other students. Please note that classroom placements are not determined until Friday, September 6, after teachers have had an opportunity to assess each class grouping.

### **Classroom Placement in September**

We are currently holding student placement meetings to arrange classes for September. Your child's current teacher plays a significant role in making these decisions as does next year's teachers, Administration, and in some cases, staff from support services (i.e., Learning Assistance teacher, Counselor, Inclusion Teacher etc.). The development of class lists is given a great deal of time, careful thought and understanding with the knowledge teachers have of each student and what will be in the child's best interest. Since teachers see how students function in a classroom every day, they are confident that they can make a suitable placement for your child. Every year, we have a small number of parents wishing to make placement requests for their children and we ask that those requests come before we start the process of creating classes. We do encourage parents to have a conversation with your child's current classroom teacher prior to making a request. Parents requesting a specific class configuration/division, should place their request in writing to their current classroom teacher and copy to the office. Requests for placements are considered during the class building process, but not all can be accommodated for a variety of factors, and we are not able to accommodate parent requests for students to be 'switched' from one class to another once classes have been set.

There are many factors that are considered in the process:

- academic achievement
- class size, composition and balance between genders
- neuro-divergent needs of students
- learning and teaching styles
- peer dynamics and social groupings
- teacher and School Based Team recommendations
- previous placement history

It should be noted that there are several additional factors, including changing enrolments, Provincial class size and composition legislation, and budget restrictions, that sometimes make the placement of students a very complex issue. Therefore, parent requests will be accepted as input but should not be considered as the driving force behind placement decisions. Our goal in creating each classroom composition is to provide the best possible educational placement for the students within the various constraints of the system within which we function. We appreciate your understanding of this very important issue.

We will reassess the class and school organization after the August registration period as we become aware of any enrolment changes that have taken place over the summer. As is the case every year in all schools, teaching assignments and class organizations are subject to change in the fall. Class lists will be posted (by student PEN number) on our website on the Friday before the first day of school in September and again by name at the front of the school on the morning of the first day of school. In this process, the Principal has the ultimate responsibility under the *School Act* for the final decision regarding placements of students.

### **School Organization**

As of May 2026, our projected enrolment is approximately 380 students. The **tentative** teaching staff and class configuration are as follows. We are just starting the staffing process.

### **Blended Classes**

As the school year draws to a close, some parents may find that in the coming school year, their child will be placed in a "mixed age, split or blended" classroom. There is a great deal of research showing both pros and cons, but the reality is, blended classes are in every school and at every grade level across North America.

Here are some considerations of blended classes:

- Achievement is the same as, or better than, the academic achievement of children in same-grade classrooms.
   Mixed-age classrooms do not negatively affect student achievement, and students in these classrooms have significantly more positive attitudes toward school, themselves, and others (Stone, 1998; Veenman, 1996).
- There is a wide range of academic, social, and emotional abilities within any grade grouping.
- Students are assigned a grade based on their age and not based on academic achievement, ability or social/emotional factors. In every classroom, there are students who may be reading at one, two, even three grade levels higher or lower than the grade they are assigned. Blended classes can often have less of a range of abilities because students are sometimes grouped homogenously. It's a fact that in any classroom, there will be at least 3-4 different reading levels amongst the students. This is why all Primary classrooms have leveled reading resources from levels 4 17. This allows teachers to match each student's needs to an appropriate level.
- The curriculum focuses on each student's needs and skills as opposed to grade level content. With the focus
  on skills and core competencies, grade configuration is not a significant factor in student achievement.
  Engaging students in personalized, deep learning is our goal and blended classes lend themselves to this
  approach.

### Other Considerations of Blended Classrooms

Instead of looking at a classroom of students 'assigned' to a specific grade due to their birthdate, think of the classroom as simply a group of students, all at different levels of ability, needs and strengths.

Children develop a sense of family with their classmates. They become a "family of learners" who support and care for each other. Older children can serve as mentors and take leadership roles.

Children are more likely to cooperate than compete. The spirit of cooperation and caring makes it possible for children to help each other as individuals, not see each other as competitors. This is consistent with our school district's goal to ensure we prepare all students for today and tomorrow, and to inspire them to be thinkers, learners, collaborators, contributors, and innovators – attributes that can only be developed in diverse learning environments.

In a multi-age classroom, older children model more sophisticated approaches to problem solving, and younger children can accomplish tasks they could not do without the assistance of older children. This dynamic increases the older child's level of independence and competence.

Blended classrooms promote a positive school culture because the older students have learned the routines of the school and they are in a position, through daily classroom experiences, to model, mentor and help support the younger students. They "show them the ropes" so to speak (a very powerful influence, more so than adults).

### KIDS, BE STREET S.M.A.R.T.!

#### SIDEWALKS:

Use sidewalks! Stay on the inside edge, and stand away from the edge when you want to cross the street. If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic so that you can see oncoming vehicles.

#### MUSIC:

If you are listening to music, remove one earpiece while crossing the street or walking in your neighbourhood, so you can hear the traffic around you.

#### ATTENTION:

Watch out for moving vehicles backing out of driveways, back alleys, and in parking lots.

#### ROAD CROSSING:

Always cross at an intersection or crosswalk. To cross safely, make eye contact with the drivers in all lanes to make sure they are stopped.

#### TEAM UP:

It's safer and more fun to walk to school with family or friends and good exercise too.

#### Neighborhood Safety Tips

#### SAFETY IN NUMBERS

Team up with another parent or neighbor to share the responsibilities of walking to and from school. If students are older, encourage them to walk with friends or older siblings.

#### AWARENESS AND INDEPENDENCE

Teach your children how to stay safe by identifying friendly neighbours or safe public places. Warn them about high traffic areas or corners that might hide hazards. Exploring and teaching kids about your community and city at a young age are lessons that will help them travel safer.

### S.U.P.E.R. Bike Safety

Practice these bike safety tips at all times when riding your bike!

Signs: Use your hand signals when riding your bike and obey traffic signs.

Use caution: Leave space when riding next to parked cars and watch out for doors swinging open. Wear light or bright coloured clothing, bike lights and reflectors, so you can be easily seen.

Protection: Wear your helmet when riding your bike - it's the law.

Eye contact: Make eye contact with other road users (drivers and pedestrians) to improve safety for everyone.

Right hand side: Ride your bike single file and as far to the right hand side of the road as possible. Use bike lanes if they are available.

#### Park & Walk

Families who are unable to walk all the way to school can still contribute to improved traffic safety and healthy schools. Park at your school's designated area or, park legally on a street away from the school. Walk the last few blocks with your children, allowing them to enjoy a little extra active time outdoors.
